*Completing an externship results in three hours experiential credit. These hours are split between a classroom component and completing roughly 100 hours of work at a field placement.

To enroll for a judicial externship, simply register for section 1 of the class. The professor of the class will match you with a judge whose court will serve as the field placement.

To enroll for a government/non-profit externship, you must apply for acceptance at a field placement. See our list of recent field placements for employment settings who regularly accept our students. Your field placement does not necessarily need to come from the list, however; you are welcome to identify and pursue your own field placement at a non-profit or government employer and then petition for that employer to be approved as a field placement. To express interest in applying to a field placement from the list, or to seek approval of a new field placement, please contact Professor Hughes, Director of Clinics and Externships. Once you have been accepted at an approved field placement, we will register you for the relevant section of the externship class.

**Note on Kentucky Innocence Project:

To enroll for the Kentucky Innocence Project (KIP), you must apply similarly as to the government or non-profit externships. Once you have been accepted by KIP, we will put you into the KIP course. The KIP course is a year long commitment resulting in a total of 4 hours experiential credit (2 hours in the fall and 2 hours in the spring).
